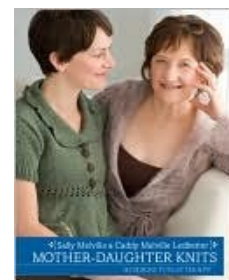


## [Knitting in Plain English by Maggie Righetti](#) (746.43 RIGHE)

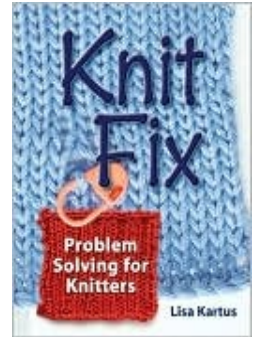


**[Stitch 'N Bitch Superstar Knitting](#) by Debbie Stoller (746.43 STOLL)**

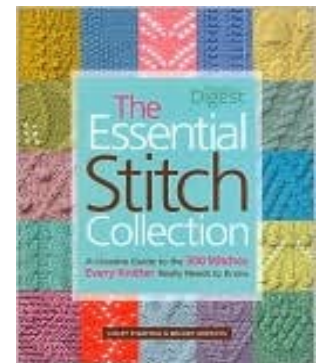


**[Baby Knits for Beginners](#) by Debbie Bliss (746.43 BLISS)**
