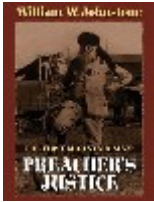
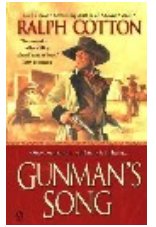

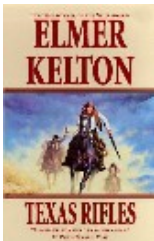


[Preacher's Justice](#) by William W. Johnstone

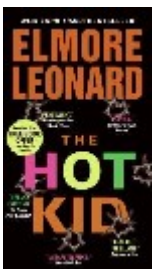
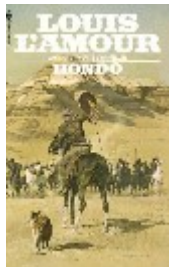


[Texas Rifles](#) by Elmer Kelton

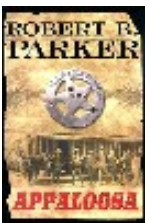


[Sin Killer](#) by Larry McMurtry
