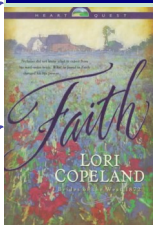

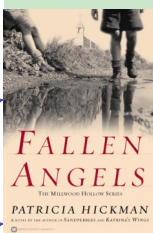
A Place Called Bliss by Ruth Glover

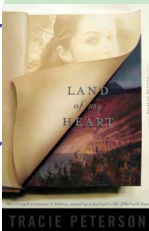
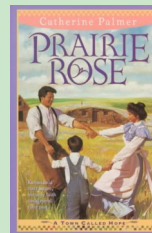


The Stars for a Light by Lynn Morris

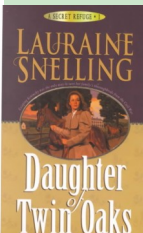


Land of My Heart by Tracie Peterson
