




Oak View Farm Animals Connect-the-Dots

COW




Almost every farm has at least one cow! Cows provide milk each day. Some farms are called "dairy farms" because they raise cows for milk.

HORSE




Horses used to pull heavy plows that dug up the earth so the farmer could plant seeds and grow a crop. They also pulled wagons and carriages to and from town. What took their place?

CHICKEN



PIG



GOAT


