**BONUS:** The deadline for filing for Korean service and all prior wars has expired in those States approving such payments. Nineteen States and one Territory have approved payment of a bonus for Vietnam service. They are: Connecticut, Delaware, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Montana, New Hampshire, North Dakota, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Vermont, Washington, West Virginia, and Guam. Illinois has indefinitely extended this benefit. Some States have granted or are in the process of granting payments for Persian Gulf War Service. North Carolina has not paid a bonus to the veterans of any war. Instead the State provides an extensive program of scholarships for qualifying children of certain categories of deceased, disabled, or POW/MIA veterans. **See: EDUCATION**

**EDUCATION (Active Duty)**

Any member of the armed services qualifying for admission to an institution of higher education as defined in G.S. 116-143,1(a)(3) but not qualifying as a resident for tuition purposes shall be charged the in-state tuition rate for enrollments while a member of the armed services stationed in this state.

**EDUCATION (Veterans):**

On May 17, 2001, Governor Easley signed into law Session Law 2001-86, which directs the State Board of Education to issue special high school diplomas to all honorably discharged veterans of World War II, Korea, and Vietnam who request the diploma and who have not

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previously received high school diplomas. As a result of this law and in honor of the sacrifices of these veterans, the State Board of Education authorized the Department of Public Instruction to issue special diplomas to those who served in WWII, Korea, and Vietnam and who present legal documentation of being honorably discharged from military service.

### **EDUCATION (DEPENDENTS):** [www.ncveterans.com/scholarship.htm](http://www.ncveterans.com/scholarship.htm)

In appreciation for the service and sacrifices of North Carolina's war veterans and as evidence of this State's concern for their children, N.C.G.S. Chapter 165, Article 4, establishes a scholarship program for these children. The scholarships are divided into "Classes" with Classes I-A, I-B, & IV as automatic awards; both Classes II & III as competitive scholarship classes, with up to 100 awards per year per class. Class II & III are selected with consideration of the following:

1. Financial need
2. Scholastic Achievement
3. Character, reputation, accomplishments, and handicaps (if any)
4. Other significant family circumstances (for example: invalid child, terminal illness for mother or father, or deceased)

Only one scholarship may be granted pursuant to this Article with respect to each child and it shall not extend for longer period than **FOUR** academic years, which years, however, need not be consecutive. No educational assistance shall be afforded a child under this Article after the end of an eight-year period beginning on the date the scholarship is first awarded. If a child is selected for a scholarship under this Article and the child is a senior in high school or its equivalent, the scholarship shall be awarded pending the graduation of the child (**Proof of graduation and school affidavit must received by June 30 in the current year**). The scholarship cannot be used in out of state institution; and those in the state must meet the requirements of subsection 165-22.1 (Private Institution) of this Article; and Chapters 115A and Article 3 Chapter 116 (State Institution).

All Class II and III scholarship applications **must be received in the Director's Office, Raleigh on or before March 1 (NO EXCEPTION)**. (*In order to allow sufficient time to establish a child's eligibility for a scholarship, all applications for Class II and III should be filed as soon as possible*). Any application received after March 1 will be accepted as an application for the following year. An Applicant, who is denied for reasons other than establishing eligibility, may apply for consideration in the following year. Applications for Classes I-A, I-B, or Class IV (Automatic scholarships) **do not** have a filing deadline and will be accepted anytime.

**Eligibility:** There are specific requirements established by the Statute that define those veterans and their children who are eligible to apply for the NCDVA scholarship. The scholarship program is an instance in which the NCDVA accredited service officer can *adjudicate* an application and avoid pursuing those applications that do not meet the eligibility requirements. Service officers are encouraged to pursue making application for possible VA benefits if the awarding of such benefits would establish a child's eligibility for the NCDVA scholarship. (**See "NORTH CAROLINA DIVISION OF VETERANS AFFAIRS SCHOLARSHIP SUMMARY"**).

Of great importance is the determination of residency for the veteran and child. Basically the child must be attending school in North Carolina or have graduated from such; the child must

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have been born in North Carolina and has lived in the State continuously since birth (this can be waived if it can be demonstrated that the child's mother was a native-born resident of North Carolina and was such resident at the time of her marriage to the veteran and was outside the State temporarily at the time of the child's birth, following which the child was returned to North Carolina within a reasonable period of time where the child has since lived continuously). A child may also establish eligibility if their veteran parent was a legal resident of North Carolina at the time of the veteran's entrance into that period of service in the armed forces during which eligibility is established under N.S.G.S. 165-22.

### **ELECTIONS:**

1. Absentee Registration and Voting. Persons who are in the armed forces, their spouses, veterans in government hospitals, etc., who are otherwise qualified to vote may register and vote by mail in primaries and general elections, subject to the procedural details set forth in the law. (GS 163-245)
2. Disabled Voters, Primary or General Elections.
  - a. Assistance in Voting. Handicapped voters are entitled to assistance as prescribed in the law, in getting to and from the voting booth and in marking their ballots. Additional procedures apply to blind persons. (GS 163-152; GS 163-152.1)
  - b. Voting Outside the Voting Enclosure. Voters who are able to travel to the voting place, but because of age, physical disability or physical barriers encountered at the voting place are unable to enter same without physical assistance, may vote from their vehicles or in the immediate proximity of the voting place, subject to certain procedures prescribed by law. (GS 163-155)

### **EMPLOYMENT:**

Preference in State Government employment is granted to veterans, their surviving spouses or the spouses of disabled veterans, without regard to age, provided they are otherwise qualified. (GS 126-80 to 126-83; GS 128-15) Military leave and reemployment rights are also granted State employees. (GS 128-39; GS 165-43). The Employment Service Division of the Employment Security Commission assists in endeavoring to secure suitable employment for disabled veterans. (GS 96-21). Any person desiring information and assistance with matters related to employment and job placement should contact the nearest local employment office of the Employment Security Commission. Veteran's Employment Representatives are available to render specialized service for veterans.

### **GUARDIANS:**

State law provides for the appointment and supervision of guardians for incompetent veterans, incompetent dependents of veterans and minor dependents of members of the armed forces or veterans in certain circumstances, to manage U. S. funds payable to such persons. (GS 34)

**HANDICAPPED PARKING PRIVILEGES:** Disabled veterans issued a registration plate pursuant to GS 20-79.4 (See Licenses) are entitled to park in spaces designated for the handicapped and unlimited parking time in most parking zones having time restrictions.

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**LEAVE, MILITARY, FOR STATE EMPLOYEES:** See Employment

## **LICENSES:**

### **1. Driver License**

In general, State law allows a military drivers license expiration procedure within the Division of Motor Vehicles to renew upon request to North Carolina residents on active duty, to their spouses and dependent children.

### **2. Hunting and Fishing.**

- a. All 50% (or more) disabled veterans may obtain a lifetime hunting-fishing license upon the payment of \$10. (GS 113-270.2[9]; GS 113-271[d][8]). **See NCDVA Memo No. 2, County seq. No. 2, dated 1-4-2007.**
- b. Members of the U. S. Armed Forces stationed in North Carolina, their spouses and their dependents under age 18 residing with them are deemed residents of North Carolina for the purpose of purchasing licenses issued by the Wildlife Resources Commission. (GS 113-130[4][e])

### **3. Auto License Plates**

The NC Division of Motor Vehicles provides specialized automotive license tags for a variety of active duty military, active Reserve, National Guard, Veterans Organizations, disabled veterans, military award recipients, and for other veteran related categories. The DMV maintains an Internet web site at [www.dmv.dot.state.nc.us](http://www.dmv.dot.state.nc.us), which provides additional information. Additional information and applications can be located at the local DMV offices throughout the state.

## **FEES:**

All specialized registration plates are subject to the regular plate fee and any additional fees for a specialized license plate unless otherwise noted (GS 20-79,7).

- (1) **American Legion** – Issuable to a member or a supporter of the American Legion. The plate shall bear the words “American Legion” and the emblem of the American Legion. (GS 20-79.4 [2a])
- (2) **Disabled Veteran**. – Issuable to a veteran of the armed forces of the United States who suffered a 100% service-connected disability. (GS 20-79.4 [8])(**FREE**)(**Application Form MVR-33**)
- (3) **Legion of Valor** – Issuable to a recipient of one of the following military decorations: the Congressional Medal of Honor, the Distinguished Service Cross, the Navy Cross, or the Air Force Cross. The plate shall bear the emblem and name of the recipient’s decoration. (GS 20-79.4 [13a])(**FREE**)
- (4) **Military Reservist** – Issuable to a member of a reserve component of the armed forces of the United States. The plate shall bear the name and insignia of the appropriate reserve component. Plates shall be numbered sequentially for the members of a component with the numbers 1 through 5000 reserved for officers, without regard to rank. (GS 20-79.4 [16])
- (5) **Military Retiree** – Issuable to an individual who has retired from the armed forces of the United States. The plate shall bear the word “Retired” and the name and insignia of the branch of service from which the individual retired. (GS 20-79.4 [16a])

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- (6) **National Guard Member** – Issuable to an active or a retired member of the North Carolina National Guard. The plate shall bear the phrase “National Guard”. A plate issued to an active member shall bear the number that reflects the seniority of the member; a plate issued to a commissioned officer shall begin with the number “1”; a plate issued to a noncommissioned officer with a rank of E7, E8, or E9 shall begin with the number “1601”; a plate issued to an enlisted member with a rank of E6 or below shall begin with the number “3001”. The plate issued to a retired or separated member shall indicate the member’s retired status. (GS 20-79.4[17])(FREE)
- (7) **Partially Disabled Veteran** – Issuable to a veteran of the armed forces of the United States who suffered a service connected disability of less than 100%. (GS 20-79.4[18])
- (8) **Pearl Harbor Survivor** – Issuable to a veteran of the armed forces of the United States who was present at and survived the attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. The plate will bear the phrase “Pearl Harbor Survivor” and the insignia of the Pearl Harbor Survivor’s Association (GS20-79.4 [19])
- (9) **Prisoner of War** – Issuable to the following: a. A member or veteran member of the armed forces of the United States who has been captured and held prisoner by forces hostile to the United States while serving in the armed forces. b. The surviving spouse of a person who had a prisoner of war plates at the time of death so long as the surviving spouse continues to renew the plate and does not remarry. (GS 20-79.4[21])(FREE)
- (10) **Purple Heart Recipient** – Issuable to a recipient of the Purple Heart award. The plate shall bear the phrase “Purple Heart Veteran, Combat Wounded” and the letters “PH”. (GS 20-79.4[22])
- (11) **Veterans of Foreign Wars** – Issuable to a member of a supporter of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. The plate shall bear the words “Veterans of Foreign Wars” or “VFW” and the emblem of the VFW. (GS 20-79.4[28])
- (12) **Combat Veterans** – Issuable to a veteran of the Armed Forces who served in a combat zone, or in waters adjacent to a combat zone, during a period of war and who was separated from the Armed Forces under honorable conditions. (GS 20-79.4) The Division may not issue the plate authorized by this subdivision unless it receives at least 300 applications for the plate. A “period of war” is any of the following:
1. World War I, which began April 16, 1917, and ended November 11, 1918.
  2. World War II, which began December 7, 1941, and ended December 31, 1946.
  3. The Korean Conflict, which began June 27, 1950, and ended January 31, 1955.
  4. The Vietnam Era, which began August 5, 1964, and ended May 7, 1975.
  5. The Persian Gulf War.
  6. Any other campaign, expedition, or engagement for which the United States Department of Defense authorizes a campaign badge or medal.
- (13) **Bronze Star** – Issuable to a recipient of this medal. The license plate shall bear an emblem of the medal with the letters “BS” (GS 20-79.4)
- (14) **Distinguished Flying Cross** – Issuable to a recipient of this medal. The license plate shall bear an emblem of the medal with the letters “FC” (GS 20-79.4)
- (15) **Silver Star** – Issuable to a recipient of this medal. The license plate shall bear an emblem of the medal with the letters “SS” (GS-20-79.4)
- (16) **Upon request, the Division shall provide and issue free of charge one registration plate to a recipient of the Congressional Medal of Honor, a 100% disabled veteran, and an ex-prisoner of war. All other special registration plates are subject to the regular motor vehicle registration fees (GS 20-79.7)**

**LOANS:** None

**MINOR VETERANS AND MINOR SPOUSES OF VETERANS:** In general, State law grants to these persons the same rights and responsibilities as though they were of legal age (18 years and older), in order to enjoy those benefits under the laws of the United States relating to veterans benefits. (GS 165, Arts 2 & 3)

**RECORDS:**

1. **Discharges:** Effective January 1, 2004, all military discharge documents filed in the Register of Deeds on or after that date shall be considered a public record with restricted access. (GS 47-13.2(a) **Restricted Access** (GS 47-113.2(b) (1) **Authorized Parties** who may record and/or request copy of military discharge documents include: (a) veteran named on document (b) Agent or representative of the veteran authorized in writing (c) Authorized agent of N.C. Division of Veteran's Affairs, this includes County Veterans Service Officers, Department of Defense, or a Court official who is assisting the veteran or veteran's beneficiaries to obtain a benefit. (d) Agent or representative of the N.C. State Archives, Certified and uncertified copies must be requested in writing by an authorized party using approved form, and in all cases, there shall be no fee charged for certified or uncertified copies of military discharge documents. (GS 47-113.2(d), (d), (d2)
2. **Other Records, Including Discharges.** Representatives of the North Carolina Division of Veterans Affairs who need copies of State and local public records in assisting clients may obtain it without charge. Exception: certain privileged and confidential records whose disclosure is otherwise provided for by law (GS 165-11)

**REEMPLOYMENT RIGHTS, STATE EMPLOYEES:** See Employment

**RETIREMENT CREDIT, MILITARY SERVICE, STATE AND PARTICIPATING LOCAL GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES:** Under certain conditions and subject to the confines of State law, credit for both State and local government retirement plans can be granted for military service performed by an eligible employee. Further inquiry should be made to Employee's Retirement and Health Benefits Division, N. C. Department of the Treasurer, Raleigh, N.C. (GS128-26; GS 135-4)

The North Carolina Division of Veterans Affairs offers a program of assistance to veterans and their dependents with claims for Federal, State, and local benefits. There is no charge for the services of this Division. A statewide network of offices is maintained, staffed by persons who are trained and experienced in advising and actively assisting citizens concerning various



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## NORTH CAROLINA DIVISION OF VETERANS AFFAIRS SCHOLARSHIP SUMMARY

In appreciation for the service and sacrifices of North Carolina's war veterans, a four year scholarship program at North Carolina approved schools has been established for the qualifying children of certain class categories of deceased, disabled, combat, or POW/MIA veterans.

### Residency Requirements:

1. At time of application, applicant must be under age 25 and Domiciled in North Carolina.
  2. Veteran parent was a legal resident of North Carolina at the time of said veteran's entrance into that period of service in the armed forces during which eligibility is established
- OR
3. The applicant is the natural child, or adopted child prior to age 15, who was born in North Carolina and has been a resident of North Carolina continuously since birth.

### Qualifying Criteria for Veteran Parent:

The veteran's qualifying criteria must have occurred during a period of war. (Exception: Eligibility may exist for peacetime veterans or reservist/National Guard if disability or death was incurred as a result of armed conflict or while engaged in extra-hazardous service.)

1. Dies during wartime service or service connected death (automatic); **or**
2. 100% totally disabled due to war time disability (automatic); **or**
3. 20-90% service connected due to war time disability (competitive); **or**
4. Received Purple Heart (competitive); **or**
5. In receipt of non-service connected pension, **or** received campaign medal, **or** veteran parent is deceased (competitive); **or**
6. Former POW or MIA (automatic)

For competitive classes, the application must be received in the Assistant Secretary's Office on or before March 1<sup>st</sup>. There is no deadline for automatic Classes.

Duration of the scholarship is four academic years (8 semesters) if used within 8 years.

The Scholarship does not cover books, computers, or supplies.
